

Teamwork and Escalating Concerns Toolkit



CHECKLIST

Consider how you might respond to a colleague who requests the need to debrief following their involvement with a patient at the end of life. Set aside some time to listen to your colleague. Share your own experiences if appropriate. Reflect on what you can learn from your colleague's experience. If you are concerned about your colleague, remind them of available support.
 Play your part in creating a <u>psychologically safe workplace</u>: Frame the work as a learning problem, not an execution problem. This creates a rationale for speaking up. Acknowledge your own fallibility. Say simple things like, "I may miss something, I need your input". Model curiosity. Ask questions.
If you observe a team member doing something particularly well while caring for a patient or interacting with a family member, give them positive feedback. Be specific. For example, instead of saying "good job today" focus on an observed behaviour, skill, or attitude.
Be prepared for disagreements to occur within your team. Knowing how to respond will greatly assist you. Do you have tools and strategies in place for addressing conflict?
